Help the shipbuilding efforts of FCS professionals - bring your new and improved dinghies and share those skills so we may all thrive in the calm to follow. Let this conference help us all arrive ready with a reviving wind in your sails and a song in your heart. My personal favorite - “I’m still standing” - or rowing as the case may be.
